Festival favours 'local jewel'

Eagle vs Shark Cinemas nationwide Showing now Directed by Taika Waititi Reviewed by Jessica Harkins

"People either get it or they don't," says Kiwi director Taika Waititi. If you're a New Zealander, you will most definitely get Eagle vs. Shark.

Considered by some to be the local jewel in the Auckland International Film Festival's crown, it was with great trepidation that Waititi introduced us to his film.

"Just remember that there are more of you than there are of the film," he

The story revolves around Lily (Loren Horsley) and Jarrod (Jemaine Clement), endearing characters of a geeky nature, who suck you right into their mundane but oddly intriguing

After getting the sack from her job at the local non-descript burger joint and playing computer games in animal costumes, Lily joins Jarrod on the quest every geek dreams of - his revenge mission. The Target: The high school nemesis.

Two peas in the same misfit pod, Lily and Jarrod promptly fall into what can only be described as love. It is a love story after all, once you get past the blunt humour and weird colloquialisms that are sure to be at one with Will-Ferrellisms the world over.

Caught in the midst of another family, Lily struggles with her feelings towards Jarrod and finds sanctuary in the company of Jarrod's father and illegitimate nine-year-old daughter.

There isn't a character in this film vou won't like. You almost wish vou were a part of their lives, that you had weird quirks and could say what they do without sounding like a complete

You can't criticise Horsley and Clement without insulting them, because they play their socially inept characters so well you'd think they were just being themselves.

But Clement's role in the comic duo Flight of the Concords and Horsley's in writing the screenplay for Eagle Vs. Shark means they are nothing of the sort. It must be hard to play the nerd when you so clearly aren't one in real life.

The soundtrack, produced by fellow Kiwi masters the Phoenix Foundation, punctuates the action

(and non-action) with such ease you never actually realise you're listening to background music. It feels like a band is playing right in the thick of it.

Overseas viewers have told Waititi, "I liked your film but I wasn't sure if I was allowed to laugh." Trust me, you're allowed to laugh, in fact you probably won't be able to stop yourself, despite any moral high-ground you choose to tread on.

By the end of the film I couldn't help but feel that Jarrod's character was based on Waititi himself, when he seriously intones, "I have to keep creating or I'll just die.

Waititi has defended his work to foreign critics, some of whom have blasted this film. His justification: "it was a low budget film. I can do what I



Knocked Up Cinemas nationwide Showing now Directed by Judd Apatow Reviewed by Mike Kilpatrick

If a film with jokes about Stephen Hawking's genitalia, sex during pregnancy and gynaecologists saying inappropriate things sounds like fun, grab a bucket of popcorn and see Knocked

That's not to say Knocked Up is just sick jokes – it's not. It tries to be romantic and heart-warming with varying degrees of success, but sick iokes are where it excels.

As well as being funny, at times it's also deliberately uncomfortable to watch (á la The Office). But when it tries to be touching, some of its failings become apparent.

While Seth Rogen (Freaks and Geeks) and Katherine Heigl (Grey's Anatomy) are good actors, their dialogue and on-screen chemistry just don't tug the heartstrings as well as other pregnancy films, such as John Hughes's 80s film She's Having a Baby.

The film started as a follow-up to director Judd Apatow's 2005 film The 40 Year Old Virgin, in which Rogen and Paul Rudd (Anchorman and Heigl's brother-in-law in this film) starred as Steve Carrell's co-workers.

But moving away from the constraints of a sequel proved successful. It allows Carrell the chance to make a cameo appearance – one of many during the film, but the only one which really works.

The film is a family affair for Apatow. His wife, Leslie Mann (George of the Jungle), plays Heigl's unhappily married sister and their two children are cast as Mann and Rudd's adorable and pop-culture-aware kids.

The film centres on the relationship between Ben Stone (Rogen) and Alison Scott (Heigl). Scott is an E! Entertainment presenter who gets pregnant after a drunken one-night stand with Stone. She has to come to terms with the impact of a baby on her life and Stone has to decide whether to give up his stoner lifestyle.

Overall, the film works well, and will play well with its target audience. However, it would be a better film

if 20 minutes were cut off the running time. There are scenes that add little to the overall story, but reduce the pace of the film. Chief-in-culprit is a boy's trip to Las Vegas involving magic mushrooms and a psychedelic trip to Cirque du Soleil.

While it may have been homage to Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas it turned into an overlong advert for the Cirque and a bizarre conversation about hotel room chairs.

But there is plenty going on in the film which will keep movie-buffs happy and dragged-along partners chuckling. There are many references to other films which give film geeks the chance to laugh at the in-jokes. And at times it hints at the elements of self-doubt that can arise in relationships, in ways that it was easy to relate to. For the type of film it is, the positives outweigh the negatives.

Towards the end of the film a gynaecologist tells Rogen's character "if you want a special experience, go to a Jimmy Buffett concert." How true. But if you want an enjoyable two hours and 20 minutes, go and see Knocked Up.
