Karen Walker's summer collection Tree Girl is one of her best yet.

Walker first showed this new collection earlier this year at London Fashion Week, where it received rave reviews

Pieces from the collection have featured in ID, Black Book, Australian Vogue and style.com. The Evening Standard featured a fourpage spread of current it-girl Theodora Richards wearing pieces from the collection. This is testament to the hipness and wearability of the clothes.

This collection also sees the welcome return of high-waisted pants. It seems that a move away from bum cleavage and the dreaded muffin effect is the next big thing in fashion.

But if you have hips of any shape or form, proceed with caution. This is not a look that everybody can pull off.

These high waists give a distinct 70s feel to the collection, reminiscent of Walker's 2005 summer collection Liberal and Miserable. Cinched waists, cap sleeves, mannish shirts and dotty prints add to the charming 70s vibe.

Tree Girl also references the current 80s trend with her puffball skirts and dresses. While not particularly wearable, they are surprisingly appealing. All Walker's collections have a quirky retro feel to them, and Tree Girl is no exception.

Crochet is big this season, and Karen Walker interprets the trend in her own original way by adding cute and quirky crochet collars to mannish shirts and rugby style t-shirts. Bows on skirts and frills on dresses add a more feminine edge to the collection.

Blocks of black feature heavily, but the distinctly colourful Karen Walker prints are still present.

Tree Girl is actually far more vibrant than past collections, but still has the required Karen Walker angst.

Walker is New Zealand's most well-known designer, and it certainly isn't hard to see why.

Described as high casual, all Walker's collections have an almost anti-fashion feel to them.

Her clothes have been described by the Independent as "the kind of look that provides a means of appearing cool but not trying-too-hard, cute but not saccharine, alternative but not self consciously so".

Tree Girl continues this effortlessly cool look that is so distinctly Karen Walker.

Book of teasers supports disaster victims

Buy this book and do disaster victims a favour! If that's not enough of an inducement, try this one: Buy this book and do yourself a favour!

With an introduction by Bridget Jones creator Helen Fielding, New Beginnings is an assortment of first chapter teasers from 15 celebrated international writers.

By the time I was half-way through New Beginnings it occurred to me that New

Endings would have been a more apt title. A cancer scare, a couple dead bodies, of suicide, manslaughter, a brain tumour, a limb amputation, a wife who has disappeared and a fatal shooting all feature in the first few chapters.

Packed full of tantalising tasters selected mainly from upcoming books. New Beginnings introduces authors who readers might usually dismiss as not their kind of thing. Chick lit and horror are two sections that I routinely walk past in book stores, but I have to admit to thoroughly enjoying Maeve Binchy's contribution happy ending and all.

Stephen King's tale of an marries the Italian who refuses author shot by a lunatic fan was another engaging surprise among the works I didn't really expect to like.

Other standouts for me included Harlan Coben's harrowing account of a promising middle class college student whose young life is ruined by a freak accident resulting in manslaughter.

Alexander McCall Smith of Number One Ladies Detective Agency fame found himself at least one guaranteed buyer for his next novel Friends Lovers and Chocolate.

I'm intrigued by what happens to the English woman who to reveal his occupation.

Nick Hornby's much-discussed new novel A Long Way Down deals with suicide in a frank manner but failed to hook me, as did Joanna Trollope's suburban tale of a loss in which a couple deal in their own ways with the departure of their youngest son.

Trumpeted by publishers Bloomsbury as "an unprecedented global publishing event," New *Beginnings* is a novel way (sorry) to raise money for victims of the Boxing Day tsunami. Around 90 per cent of the proceeds from book sales (about NZ\$1.1 million to date) is channelled directly to

charity organisations working in the stricken regions.

I admit to the churlish suspicion that although published solely as a revenue-raising venture, New Beginnings is also something of a literary guinea pig

Ever eager to discover something new and sure to sell, other publishing houses will surely be glancing at the book's sales figures with something more than a philanthropic eye.

I hope they are impressed by what they see. New Beginnings deserves support from anyone who cares about supporting good causes or widening their literary horizons.
